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Eligibility Recommendations

The cabin on the Baldy Boss claim is the site's most important and distinct feature and retains architectural integrity relative to the timeframe of the 1890s to the 1910s. Because the cabin retains integrity, and is separate in time and function from the adjacent prospect workings, which lack integrity, the cabin is recommended eligible for the SRHP under Criterion C. The prospect workings and a recent privy are recommended as non-contributing elements of the site. The cabin cannot be tied to important events, themes, or persons, and from a broad perspective, it is a relatively common building type in the West. The cabin also apparently lacks buried deposits of significance. For these reasons, the cabin is recommended ineligible for the NRHP. The adjacent Ouray Mine site and sawmill (Site 5ST268) lend ambiance and feel to the site.

In terms of *Criterion C*, the cabin is a sound representative of the types of residential log cabins that were once important to and common in the Breckenridge area prior to the 1910s. The cabin is highly intact and locally important because such buildings outside of Breckenridge are currently disappearing.

In combination with the sawmill remnant on the adjacent Ouray Mine site, the cabin can serve as a contributing element of the Breckenridge area's historic fabric. The cabin is an example of early Breckenridge vernacular architecture and is a type of building that is disappearing due to development. The cabin, again in combination with the sawmill remnant, contributes to a localized visual landscape.

Management Recommendations

Management recommendations suggest several actions based in part on the potential for the Town of Breckenridge to adapt the cabin for public use. First, the cabin should be stabilized and repaired. This will probably require replacing rotten wall footers and raising the sagging west wall. Second, for a sense of aesthetic value, the cabin can be restored to original condition, which includes removing prefabricated materials, replacing the door with a sympathetic version, and replacing plexiglass windows with multipane units. Third, the rotten planks of the deck by the entry should be replaced. Last, if the site is adapted for public use, then toilet facilities may be necessary. The existing privy can be repaired and brought back into use, with the Cucumber Gulch property (Site 5ST995) serving as an example. The privy's underlying flooring and support beams will have to be replaced.
