- 16. Walls: The walls consist of corrugated sheet iron nailed to a vernacular 2x4 frame.
- 17. Foundation/Basement: The privy's 2x4 subframe lies on the ground.
- 18. Chimney(s): None
- 19. Windows: None
- 20. Doors: The west wall features a door, 30 inches wide and 78 inches high, made with planks.
- 21. Porches: None
- 22. General Architectural Description: The privy is a shed facing west. The front is 7 feet high and the rear is 6 feet high, and the structure is 3½ by 4 feet in area. The door, 30 inches wide and 78 inches high, was made with planks. The walls consist of corrugated sheet iron nailed to a vernacular 2x4 frame. The floor and bench consist of planks, and the bench features one port. The woodwork was assembled with wire nails. The pit manifests as a 55 gallon drum sunk into the underlying ground. Buried deposits are unlikely.
